Create Your Own Civilization

<u>Task</u>: You are the member of a previously undiscovered civilization and have come to Clearwater, BC to present your culture to a gathering of historians. Be as inventive and imaginative as you wish when you create your civilization, this is your chance to think creatively. The only restriction on your information is that it must be realistic and reflect an understanding of how civilizations are run.

Guidelines: Your poster must address/include sections on the following topics:

Geography

- a. Where is your civilization located?
- b. What are its boundaries?
- c. Why did you pick this area?

Government

- a. Describe your system of government.
- b. Who is in charge? How are they chosen?
- c. Whogetstobeacitizen?Whatroledotheyplay?
- d. What are some sample laws from your government?

Economics

- a. What do people do for a living?
- b. What is used for money?
- c. Who do you trade with? What do you trade?

Daily Life

- a. How is education in your civilization organized?
- b.What do people learn?

Social Studies 8 Loader

- c. How long do they go to school?
- d. Who goes to school?
- e. What forms of transportation are used? Why?
- f. What kinds of activities do people enjoy(sports, hobbies, music)?
- g. What kinds of food do people eat?
- h. What does your architecture look like? What building materials do you use? What are houses like?

Religion

- a. What is your religion like? What are the major beliefs?
- b. What holidays and festivals do you have?

Decline and Legacy

- a. How/why did your civilization fall?
- b. What accomplishments is your civilization remembered for?

Your poster must also include the following:

- 1. A name and explanation of why your civilization has that name.
- 2. A map showing where your civilization is located.
- 3. A flag with an explanation of the importance of its different features.

Information should be presented on a poster board that includes the information above, your map, a picture of your flag, and at least three other illustrations that help make your poster colorful. Be sure to organize and neatly write out your information (typing and pasting is acceptable for this).

You will present your civilization to your classmates on Tuesday, January 11th. This gives you only 4 days to complete, so you may need to use the weekend or evenings if you do not get it done in class time, so use your time wisely.
